Country Focus: Bolivia



Bolivia is a landlocked country in South America that is the size of California and Texas combined. Its terrain has great contrasts between the Andes mountains which enclose it and lowland areas of grasslands and rainforests.

The people of Bolivia can trace their ancestry to the Incan empire and the Spanish Conquistadores who came in the 16th century and colonized the land. Many of the people were forced into slavery and died from diseases.

The country won it's independence in 1825 and took the name "Bolivia" after their liberator, Simon Bolivar. Since that time there have been many years of conflict and instability. Recently, there have been improvements that have lifted up the indigenous people.

Christian missionaries came to Bolivia along with the Spanish colonists and mission to the indigenous people began in earnest. Today, the majority of Bolivians identify themselves as Catholic. Indigenous people in rural areas still retain aspects of their ancient rituals and practices that have been integrated into their Catholic faith. This faith is celebrated in various shrines, devotions and festivals that take place throughout the year.

A Saint for Mission: St. Francis Solanus Education for Community Life



Francis Solanus was born in 1549 in Spain. At the age of 20 he became a Franciscan missionary and journeyed to South America aboard a slave ship. The ship was grounded in a storm. As the crew abandoned the ship, Francis remained with the slaves until they could be rescued.

Once he made it to his mission site he developed great zeal and love for the native peoples and travelled great distances to bring

the Gospel to them. He learned the various dialects of the different tribes he encountered and thus was very successful in speaking about Christ in a way that the people could understand.

Stories are told of vast numbers of people who embraced the Christian faith due to the witness and love of St. Francis. He brought healing to the sick and people reported many miracles attributed to him. It is also said that Francis had the gift of prophesy and was able to prepare his people for difficult times and natural disasters that did actually occur later. He also became the guardian of the Church in Peru.

He died in 1610 and was canonized a saint in 1675. He is the patron saint of many countries in South America including Bolivia. His feast day is July 14th.

His only source of income was selling gum and drinks in the night club district. Choi had lost hope and was very depressed.

He heard others singing in the night clubs and this would bring him great joy so he began singing to himself. Then, his life changed when a voice coach heard Choi, took him in and gave him voice lessons.
