We pray that Earth's resources will not be misused, but be shared equally and respectfully by all.




Country Focus: Republic of Kiribati

What would you do if your home was at risk of disappearing due to rising sea levels?

For the people living in the Republic of Kiribati, a chain of 33 islands located in the Pacific Ocean between Hawaii and Australia, this question is one they have been thinking about for many years. Kiribati's islands are low -lying, and the country could lose much of its land if sea levels rise. One of the ways the Republic of Kiribati has tried to address this is by purchasing land in nearby Fiji to provide food security and a place of refuge in case its citizens, who number more than 100,000, are no longer able to live in their own country.

We can also make decisions in our daily lives that will help people in places like the Republic of Kiribati who are at risk due to the effects of climate change. Simple changes like using refillable water bottles, reusable shopping bags, and reusable containers for lunches are ways to help the environment. Being familiar with the Church's teaching on care for creation can also help guide us in being good stewards of the environment. More information on care for creation can be found in this month's newsletter. Most importantly, we can join Pope Francis in prayer this month and pray for the just sharing of Earth's resources.

In 2015, he wrote the encyclical "Laudato Si" encouraging everyone to consider how their actions affect our shared planet. He even chose his papal name, "Francis," in honor of St. Francis of Assisi, partly because of St. Francis of Assisi's love for creation.



Pope Francis was born on December 17, 1936. His family had immigrated to Argentina from Italy, and his father was an accountant. He graduated as a chemical technician before discerning the priesthood. He was ordained a priest on December 13, 1969, and made his final profession with the Jesuits on April 22, 1973. He became the Archbishop of Buenos Aires on February 28, 1998, and then was elected Supreme Pontiff on March 13, 2013. He is the first Pope from the Americas. He is known for living a simple lifestyle in solidarity with the poor.

Pope Francis challenges all of us to be good stewards of God's creation. Being "protectors of God's handiwork is essential to a life of virtue; it is not an optional or a secondary aspect of our Christian experience" (Laudato Si', no. 217). He asks us to consider "What kind of world we want to leave to those who come after us, to children who are now growing up?" (Laudato Si', no. 160). Let us follow the example and guidance of Pope Francis and reflect on "the impact of our every action and personal decision on the world around us" (Laudato Si', no. 208). Doing so will help give us the hope that "we will truly be able to develop a different lifestyle and bring about significant changes in society" (Laudato Si'. no. 208).

## Care for Creation



The Church teaches that all Catholics are called to care for creation. Caring for creation is how we show our gratitude to God for God's gift of creation, and also how we show our concern for our brothers and sisters around the world.

In his encyclical *Laudato Si'*, which celebrates its fifth anniversary this year, Pope Francis teaches us that caring for creation and caring for the poor are connected. When we consider how best to be good stewards of creation, we must do so in a way that allows us "to hear both the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor" (*Laudato Si'*, no. 49). This is because when we fail to take care of creation, the poor can be the most affected: "For example, the depletion of fishing reserves especially hurts small fishing communities without the means to replace those resources; water pollution particularly affects the poor who cannot buy

bottled water; and rises in the sea level mainly affect impoverished coastal populations who have nowhere to go" (*Laudato Si*', no. 48). This is why it is important that the Earth's resources are shared equally and respectfully by all, and why Pope Francis asks us to pray during the month of September that the Earth's resources not be misused. We have been asked by God to be the stewards of God's creation and make sure that all people, now and yet to come, have access to the resources they need to ensure their right to life and human dignity.
