Stories of encountering Christ in global mission

In The Company of Angels at Christmas

Advent and Christmas tell many stories of angels bringing the good news to

the poor. An angel announced to Mary that she would give birth to the savior and an angel offered encouragement to Joseph in a dream. Angels declared the good news of the messiah's birth to the poor shepherds tending their flocks in the field. Yes, an angel is that messenger of God bringing good news to the poor and the marginalized. Our word for the Gospel and for evangelizing comes from the same root word as an *angel* - one who brings good news.

Jesus came as the good news among us who lived on the margins of his society. He said, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because He has anointed me to bring good news to the poor, proclaim liberty to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free" (Luke 4:18).

Like the angels of the Bible, missionaries still bring good news to the poor. Missionaries make their homes among those who live on the margins. They spend their lives providing the necessities of life. They join in bringing healing to the sick and comfort to those wounded by the

To be a missionary means offering words of comfort and encouragement of God's love through their witness, prayer and sacramental ministry. They are the hands and feet, the voice and the face of God among those they serve. Missionaries stand in solidarity with those who face threats to their human dignity and accomany them as they seek a more just world.

During this season, we celebrate how close God has come to us. In a similar way, missionaries stay in close proximity to those they serve and remain a living witness of Emmanuel - God with us. Proximity with others can bring us closer to the margins of society so that the

As Social Mission Outreach Coordinator for the Center for Mission, Adam focuses on activites that bridge individuals and

communities in solidarity with those on the fringes of society.

The Social Mission department of the Center for Mission has been active in 2021, connecting Catholics to activities of solidarity with the poor and those on the fringes.

Events of 2020 left us with a number of deep challenges related to equality and justice, particularly in Minnesota, as we develop the next steps of our growing social mission in response to

these challenges.

This year we wanted to create space where people were able to engage in deep social questions relevant today. For example, the *Fratelli Tutti,* encylical by Pope Francis 10/2020, dialogue series on Zoom was an opportunity to hear presentations and

discussion regarding what *Fratelli Tutti* teaches us for today's issues.

Another example of reaching beyond our selves for a more humane and just world is the Care for Creation team. Given the unprecedented climate

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disasters throughout the United States, the eco-consciousness of many individuals was raised and they desired a way to respond. The team created retreat resources for parishes and initiated dialogue regarding renewable energy. Additionally, college students are raising their voices expressing their desires and hopes for the future. The Team is attentively iincluding them in activities that are relevant to them.

The Care for Creation teams' objectives are to inspire participants to

act through education, advocacy and a deeper spritual understanding of Care for Creation issues, especially through the Papal book, *Laudato Si.* People are concerned and anxious and the Care for Creation team is an outlet for that

concern.

As it is important to help the poor and needy, beyond our borders, the USCCB Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD) distributed \$225,000 to organizations formed to break the cycle of poverty by encouraging low-income people to make decisions and participate in activities and planning that affect their lives. Our CCHD


teams are growing and developing new ministry activities to help the poor.

Future activities will focus on the importance of solidarity enabling us to bridge to encounters of Christ. Topics discussed will penetrate the surface

of issues that have marred human dignity and provide opportunities that enable a deeper connection with those in our communities.

Reaching beyond

throughout his papacy, Pope Francis has consistently encouraged Catholics to live a culture of encounter. The global mission outreach efforts of the Center for Mission are one way we respond to Pope Francis' call to encounter Christ in one another.

So what does global mission outreach include at the Center for Mission? We offer a variety of opportunities to encounter others.

We encourage and support parish partnership ministries through an annual workshop, where staff and lay

leaders are invited to encounter and leam from experts and one another. We provide educational



resources and programming to schools and parishes, like our annual Writing Contest which encourages K-12 students in the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis to reflect on their personal

call to mission, and our annual Living Water Program, which invites local youth to encounter our partners in the Diocese of Kitui, Kenya by learning about their lives and the importance of access to clean water during drought. Children are encouraged to raise funds to help.

Finally, we offer additional opportunities for reaching beyond

our borders through our relationship with the Maronite Archdiocese of Damascus, Syria and delegation trips through the Archdiocesan partnership with the Diocese of Kitui, Kenya. By hosting visitors from our partnership parishes and archdioceses, and by visiting those same parishes and archdioceses in return, local Catholics are able to form relationships with our Christian brothers and sisters in other parts of the world, learn from them, and walk in faith with them.

Gregg Darr, member of the Damascus partnership leadership team and mission recruiter for Maryknoll Fathers and

Brothers, said his experience with the Damascus partnership has opened his eyes. "Not only has this experience

made me aware

of the suffering

of sisters and brothers in Syria," Gregg said, "but also to their incredible faith, perseverance and hope. A partnership works both ways; we can learn from and be inspired by those who pray for us from abroad, even in the midst of their own sorrows and joys."

Mary Jo Voxland, Chair of the Delegation Team for the Kitiui Partnership, described receiving visitors

from Kitui as a family reunion. "You can see the love that we all have for each other," Mary Jo said. "When I



returned to Kitui in 2014 for the 10-year anniversary [of the partnership] it was like going back home to my extended family. Being involved in this partnership has helped me not only to build new relationships but to see that we are all one in our Lord, Jesus Christ."

Shorter Immersion Encounters

Reaching beyond our borders is important as Catholics as we encounter Christ in mission and experience and bring home those, often transformative, experiences.

Eric Simon at the Center for Mission organizes and supervises these experiences in several global mission archdioceses and dioceses that have included Jamaica, Northern Alaska and India.

Encounters through these shorter-term Immersion trips have touched the many delegates on the trips.

For example, Ann Matson joined the delegation to Northern Alaska, which had an incredible effect on all. Our immersion trip touched the Athabascan native community. She stated, "This journey to northern Alaska made us all appreciate our 'easier' lives, and yet we envied the Alaskans' and Athabascan's focus and joy of their Catholic faith. This was a renewing experience causing

me to examine my involvement and commitment to my own parish and to ponder how I could share it best with others. It was a gift that I brought home and I am thankful for the experience through the Center for Mission."

expect and when I experienced the elementary schools and children who learned through joy and curiosity, I was amazed and touched. The teachers were so gifted and the work that the children produced was quite good, even in situations that would be less than ideal. This experience re-ignited a passion in me to work with children and teach again."

Transformational experiences like those above are common for delegates during trips and have led to inspired activities afterwards. The next planned trip is to the mountains of Jamaica in the Diocese of Mandeville. This trip will be for eight days at the end of January, 2023. We are still affected by COVID as Jamaica has been, so we plan on 2023 in the hopes of traveling safely.
