of the work of the Center for Mission, the image of a living

bridge comes to mind. The Center for Mission is part of an international network called the Pontifical Mission Societies, which connects us to the universal mission of the Church. The word 'pontifical' comes from a root word that means 'bridge.' Our role is to build bridges of faith between the local Church and the universal Church beyond our borders.

One of the bridges is the way we gather financial and spiritual support to assist more than 1,150 mission diocese in more than 100 countries. Throughout the year, we send your

donations and prayers to support young and developing churches which are working to establish the Church's ministeries in remote areas

We build bridges for those from our Archdiocese who feel called to serve

We deepen our sense of being Catholic and part of the universal Church. We provide encounters of faith to our schools and parishes, making

and particular churches. As an Archdiocese, we continue to have partnerships with the Church in

Our Partnership with the Diocese of Kitui, Kenya

What began as notes on a napkin over lunch in 2003 has become one of the longest diocesan solidarity partnerships in existence. Our relationship with the

Diocese of Kitui, Kenya, celebrates its 20th Anniversary this year, reaching a milestone for a ministry that has touched the lives of hundreds.

When Catholic Relief Services called Deacon Mickey Friesen, Director of the Center for Mission, back in 2003 asking if he wanted to enter into a global solidarity partnership with a diocese in Africa, he was intrigued.



"We were learning about the US Bishops Called to Global Solidarity (1997) and A Call to Solidarity with Africa (2001). There was an explicit call to dioceses to become more personally engaged and partner with the Church in Africa. We were also witnessing a surge of interest in our parishes regarding partnering with the Church beyond our borders. All of this together led us to talk with Archbishop Flynn about moving forward." Deacon Mickey then contacted Dale Hennen, who had missionary experience and was also the Director of Rural Life for the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis, they along with Mike

Haasl, also from the Center for Mission, sat down over lunch and imagined what such a partnership might look like (recording their meeting on a napkin).

Following a suggestion from Archbishop Flynn, they decided to solicit help from parishes in the Southeast Deanery of the Archdiocese, after receiving their support, moved forward with plan to partner with the Diocese of Kitui, Kenya. The partnership was formalized in 2004 and has served as a bridge between Catholics in Kitui



and Minnesota ever since, enabling us to build relationships based on our shared faith.

The partnership allows our two dioceses to share with one another our lives, cultures, faith, and resources. We have centered our sharing on water, as here in MN it is so plentiful, while in Kitui it is faced with ongoing drought and limited access to clean water. Through the partnership, lifelong friendships have been made and we have learned about and from one another. Julie Woodruff, chair of the Kitui Leadership Team said, "This twenty-year global solidarity partnership has taught me that relationships across continents can be built and sustained if persons are willing to learn about, appreciate, and respect each other's cultural differences, and discover through sharing stories of faith,

experiences and resources, how we are more alike than different. It has deepened by faith and broadened my perspective of the universal church."



Deacon Mickey credits the longevity of the partnership to how it was formed and managed. "We founded this partnership on a

principle of mutuality. This meant that we are equal partners, rooted in baptism, called together to share our gifts with each other. We discern and carry out all activities together. We also believe that everything we do is for the sake of deepening and growing our relationship in faith together. The power of the partnership is in building relationships. This partnership has really been a concrete way for us to experience what it means to be Catholic."
